Role-specific information

Role Summary

The role holder works as a chief teaching technician responsible for both undergraduate and graduate students as well as fellow teaching technicians of lower grade whilst within the section. The physical chemistry teaching section has an annual budget of £8000 under the total control of the role holder. The undergraduates are second year, Part 1B, and third year, Part II, students which this year has a daily attendance of approximately 25 undergraduates and one graduate student. The role holder acts as a student demonstrator, a post usually occupied by a graduate student, to approximately 10 Part II students of the undergraduate students attending daily. The role holder also sets up and runs demonstrations used in lectures which are usually of a hazardous nature. These could involve detonating explosive material, making and igniting flammable material, or as an example of a particular principle, etc. The role holder is directly responsible for ensuring the undergraduate students' requirements are provided for enabling them to carry out their course material. The role holder also liaises with external companies for the acquisition of goods and services or the resolution of errors, i.e. wrong products delivered or faulty items received or enquiries about getting bespoke items manufactured.

Key Responsibilities

Sole responsibility to the senior examiner for processing all marks for one of the four tripos examinations. This involves a high degree of confidentiality and accuracy to ensure no scripts are lost and all marks are entered into the computer correctly by organising additional checkers, ensuring the rubric has been adhered to and scaling marks to match a given criteria in conjunction with the senior examiner. Collecting, sorting and checking scripts for the other three examinations carried out for the department. Accuracy, dependability and confidentiality are essential. The deadlines can be tight and so forethought and organisation must be done well in advance if the marks are to reach the registry by the date set out by the university.

all practical work within the physical and theoretical courses.	
Providing technical advice and assistance to students, both graduate and undergraduate regarding the use of equipment (e.g., vacuum lines, used to determine the rate of reaction with gases, etc.) and instrumentation (e.g., uv/vis, used to determine the concentrations of solutions, etc. ESR, used to determine the arrangement of electrons in free radicals, etc.). Demonstration of experimental techniques and correct operating procedures.	25%
Making available and checking all chemicals, apparatus, equipment, glassware, and instruments required for the Part 1B (~ 150 students) and Part II undergraduates (~100 students) practical classes. This includes raising requisitions using CUFS for chemicals and apparatus from external sources within a set budget under the sole control of the role holder, testing analytical instruments, preparing volumetric solutions and making cyanide gases for use by students, etc. This must be done sufficiently enough in advance that all the elements are ready for use when term starts, which is a fixed deadline.	35%
Setting up and operating demonstrations in lectures for the undergraduate students during the course of the academic year, or members of the public on special occasions, e.g. science week, etc. or at external venues, e.g. the Royal Institute, London. The setting up of these can be extensive and take several days work to be ready for the required date. Planning and efficient time management are essential if the deadline is to be met and all the demonstrations are available.	10%
Duties relating to being a Section Head, these include attending Section Head meeting, ensuring the section continues to conform to any relevant rules and regulations relating to health and safety codes and practices, such as COSHH and DSEAR. Meeting the requirements laid out by the university or the department, such as fume cupboard testing and updating role profiles, etc.	10%

Person Profile

This section details the knowledge, skills and experience we require for the role.

Education & qualifications	Chemistry, to degree standard because of the demonstrating responsibilities.
Specialist knowledge & skills	Computers, associated software and printers because of the high volume of assessment work carried out on computer in excel, etc. and the numerous number of analytical tools, like FTIR, which are computer controlled and each with an associated printer which breaks down on occasion. Problem solving, this could include being confronted with questions as to why experiments failed to give the expected results, treatment of the data once the results have been obtained and need to be written up by the undergraduates, fixing apparatus when it fails to function correctly or finding information and demonstrations for a particular purpose.

Interpersonal & communication skills	Good interpersonal skills are required as daily contact with a wide variety of people is commonplace. Ability to organise time and work efficiently without supervision or external monitoring as large parts of the job are done in isolation and services must be provided at specific times which are out of the control of the role holder and deadlines for administrative and apparatus must be met.

Additional requirements	Glassblowing is desirable because some apparatus is unique to this section and is prone to frequent breaks or modifications so having the ability to work on apparatus which cannot be bought off the shelf means a rapid continuation of service and a reduced cost as the apparatus does not need to be fixed/ modified by an external source.
